#### **Open Door School Progresses on Playground**

Open Door School has made strides towards building its new playground at its location in Coal Grove.

The school moved to the location in the fall of 2019. Prior to occupancy, the site did not have one factor that was important to the staff, parents and students alike... a playground.

Jeff Townsend, facilities operations manager, headed up the project, with the help of various associates from Open Door School and Lawrence County DD.

"We started having meetings in the spring of 2021 to get an idea of what we wanted and plan the layout," says Townsend. "The playground is set on the north end of the school parking lot and part of the field is

As of the start of the 2022 school year, the playground consists of a three bay swing set, consisting of three typical belt swings and two ADA swings. In addition, there is a spring loaded fire truck, a discovery cave, and instruments and games from the school's previous playground located off Lorain St. in Ironton.

Future plans for the playground include a basketball hoop, a caterpillar climber, picnic tables and shaded structures.
