A Parent's Journey Through Early Intervention

My journey through the Early Intervention program started when my son Eli was about 18 months old. Up until then we had no concerns about his development and then almost overnight he just stopped eating and talking. Our pediatrician mentioned that he had some concerns about Eli maybe having Autism, one of the scariest six letter words we had ever heard at that point. We had no idea what it meant, so we did what any parent would do and took to the internet. Our initial reaction was to be devastated and to wonder what the future would look like for this innocent little boy that we loved with all of our hearts. As we moved past the devastation phase, we began to figure out how to maneuver this new world we had found ourselves in.

We prayed, we researched, we made calls, we asked friends, we did whatever we could to make sure that we could get him the help he needed... and that's when we came across the Early Intervention program. We had no clue what EI was or what they did but just figured that we wouldn't qualify. Luckily the nurse at his pediatrician's office made a referral for us and the day they called was truly the day our lives began to change.

I remember getting a call from a Service Coordinator who took the time to answer all the questions I had, and believe me, I had a lot. We discussed exactly what the program would look like and at that time there was an opening for Eli to participate in a play time program where he would go for 2 hours and spend time with people who would care for him like he was their own. They began to work on the speech and sensory issues that he was having with clinical based speech therapy.

When Eli was about 25 months old we received an official diagnosis of Autism from Nationwide Children's Hospital. Our Early Intervention team was there with us through the whole process so we just kept moving forward. When Eli turned 3 years old, he transitioned into preschool. The EI team helped us develop his IEP and even helped us along as Eli eventually transitioned into kindergarten.

The day the Service Coordinator called me to go over the Early Intervention program was the first day in a long time my wife and I felt like we had hope. The day the Developmental Specialist came to the house to meet Eli, he hid behind the couch and only came out for a few minutes. I will never forget her looking at me and saying "Mr. Hayton, we can't wait to work with your little man and help him reach his developmental milestones". She didn't make any promises or guarantees, but she offered not only help, but hope. For the first time in months we had a plan.

Eli is now getting ready to turn 17, is a Junior in High School, and just finished his third season as a starter on the High School Soccer team where he is the Goalkeeper. He is a fantastic guitar player for the worship band at church, is a 4.0 student, and is currently learning how to drive. There was a time in his life where I never thought I would hear him talk again and now I can't keep the child quiet, and for that I will forever be thankful for the Early Intervention program.

Our Developmental Specialist once told me something that has stuck with me to this day. After Eli was diagnosed with Autism, she said "One of the worst things we do with kids with Autism is that we try to get them involved in our world as quickly as possible. What we need to do is quickly join their world and then slowly invite them into ours." Thank you, Early Intervention. Words will never express the debt of gratitude that my family feels in our hearts for the work you have done in the life of my son.

DD Awareness Month

March is Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month in the United States. The designation, proclaimed by President Ronald Regan in 1987, who called upon Americans to provide the "encouragement and opportunities" necessary for people with developmental disabilities to reach their full potential, has been commemorated for 35 years.

Locally, the Lawrence County Developmental Disabilities (DD), the public agency responsible for funding and overseeing services to individuals with developmental disabilities across the life span, as well as providing services through its Early Intervention and Open Door School programs, will organize and host events to raise awareness.

"Our annual Chili Fest & Craft Show event, a staple in the community for many years, will be held this year after being cancelled the past two years due to COVID-19", says Julie Monroe, Lawrence County DD Superintendent. The event, which has been downsized to allow for more spacing between chili cookers and vendors, will be held at the Open Door School, located on the Lawrence County DD Campus at 606 Carlton Davidson Lane in Coal Grove on Saturday, March 12, 2022 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Admission is \$1.00 with proceeds going to the Open Door School Boosters, or a donation of a canned food item.

In addition to activities such as a cake walk, raffle drawings, craft vendors and chili contest, information about Lawrence County DD services will be available. There will also be a video presentation that highlights some of the accomplishments of individuals served.

Disabilities Awareness Month will be formally acknowledged by the Lawrence County Commissioners at their meeting scheduled for March 1, 2022, at the Lawrence County Courthouse. The Commissioners will approve a Proclamation declaring March DD Awareness Month in Lawrence County. Individuals served, their families and providers are encouraged to attend. Also, the Courthouse lawn on the 4th Street side will be decorated with purple pinwheels, and the dome will be lit purple for the month, as a reminder of the contributions of Lawrence County residents with developmental disabilities.

"We are extremely grateful for the support shown by the Lawrence County Commissioners, and will collaborate with all of our stakeholders to assure Lawrence County is a place where all people feel they belong and have an opportunity to contribute," said Monroe.

Purple pinwheels will be put on the 4th side entrance of the Courthouse along with DD Month Awareness banners, and the Courthouse dome will be lit up purple for the month of March. Service SPOTLIGHT

Early Intervention

- Before you can participate in EI, your child must be determined eligible. If you agree, your service coordinator will coordinate the eligibility.
- Eligibility for EI varies by state. In Ohio, some children who have certain diagnosed conditions are automatically eligible. Other children go through an eligibility determine process that will include an evaluation of your child’s development using information obtained from many sources, including information from you, an evaluation tool, observations of your child and review of your child’s medical records.
- Eligibility for EI is not income based and there is no cost to your family to determine whether your child is eligible for EI.






