Early Intervention, we continue to provide valuable services to children birth to

age three and their families using technology through smart phones and laptops allows us to continue providing valuable services. These services include service coordination, specialized occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language pathology, vision, hearing and early childhood mental health. Virtual services continue to support children and families by focusing on parent/child relationship and interactions, increasing parent confidence in supporting their child, allowing flexibility in scheduling times that are convenient and may include other family members and empowering families to implement strategies between sessions.

Just like so many things in our lives, physical education must change to accommodate the safety of our students. At our school PE provides specific skills to help our students grow to become healthy adults and introduces activities that they can enjoy and participate in for a lifetime. While we are not gathering in whole group activities at this time, students are provided one on one services or small group opportunities to allow social distancing to occur and still continue with the learning experience. In addition, certain equipment is used to space students apart. Masks are encouraged for students that are able to do so. Also, students receive their own piece of equipment during each session and sanitizing takes place between each use for maximum safety.
